From the Chaplain...

'The truth hurts,' they say. I think they usually mean that being told the truth can hurt. It can be hard to hear honest feedback; that the colour of that shirt really doesn't suit you, that the new outfit you tried on does actually make it look like you've eaten a few too many 'koinonia' cakes or that despite your best efforts you haven't quite reached the level you need to pass the test yet. Perhaps that's one of the reasons why, as educators, we try to phrase our criticism as suggestions for improvement and couch it in praise for the effort and progress made.

But perhaps 'the truth hurts' could also refer to the speaker of the truth. Telling the truth makes us vulnerable and opens us up to the possibility of rejection and judgement. Perhaps that is why the Samaritan woman at the well in our text for this week (John 4:4-26) was reluctant to admit the whole truth about her family and living arrangements to Jesus. No doubt this woman had already known rejection: by her former husbands, by her neighbours and by the religious and community leaders. She would have learnt to be economical with the truth in order to avoid the derision and disdain of her community.

Despite their differences and the cultural barriers which should have kept them apart and made them distrustful of each other, Jesus managed to make a connection with this woman at the well. By telling the truth and speaking honestly about their differences and their common beliefs the two had a conversation which went far beyond a request for a drink. Being courageous enough to tell the truth and to share our vulnerabilities can enable us to build deeper more honest and more meaningful relationships with one another. Our being willing to be honest and to open up encourages others to do the same. Rather than pretending to be superhuman and trying to carry the burden of our failures alone this allows us to admit that we are all human after all and so we find that we are not alone in our struggles but that we share many of the same challenges and experiences. Jesus knew this. In fact, in Jesus God made himself vulnerable to the same challenges and frustrations, the same temptations and trials that all of us face in the course of a human life. Jesus' ability to meet people where they were, without judgement, and to invite others into fellowship with him was a demonstration of God's invitation to us all: an invitation to be known, to be accepted and to be loved; no conditions and no exceptions.

May God bless us with the courage to take risks and to fail, and to share honestly our failures as well as our successes that we might enjoy deeper and more fruitful connections with him and with one another. **Amen**
